TOWN TRIVIA

Instead of happenings just in December, these are happenings in Point Marion through the years.

1724--French arrive at the confluence of the Monongahela and Cheat Rivers and establish a trading post.

1750--Agreement allows the Mason-Dixon line to separate Pennsylvania and Virginia, leaving Point Marion in Pennsylvania.

1751--First settlement here was by Wendell Brown and sons.

2

1770-Col. George Wilson was the first land owner with 108 acres and the town was called Copeland.

1778--Morgan's Tavern was operated and built by Zackquill Morgan and he ran it until 1792. (founder of Morgantown)

1842--Seth Stafford of Monongalia County, Va. is the first lot buyer and names Point Marion for Gen. Francis Marion.

1893--Point Marion becomes a borough.

1904--The volunteer fire department is formed.

1908--Cheat River bridge is constructed.

1926--Congress approves construction of the Albert Gallatin Memorial Bridge.

1929--Route 88 goes from Crow's Ferry to Dillinger Ferry in Point Marion.

1933--Plant at Crystal has 80 coke ovens and 75 workers.

1835--Cave Restaurant opens. There are two bowling and three ping pong tables in the basement.

1941--Measles hit the school children with half out of school due to illness.

1944--In January, flu epidemic leaves three dead and 500 ailing.

1947--Camp Buddy sold by the YMCA and renamed Camp Lynnwood.

1950--State widens Route 119.

1951--Town gets first police car. Bill Moser is Chief of Police.

1935--Point Marion High School has these clubs--Knitting, Mystery, Drama, Athletic, and History Club.

1938--The Dec. 8 headlines of the PM News state that \$36,000 has been approved for a new athletic field.

*New column in local paper called "News and Views" by Les Cohen. Les has the Cohen Amateur Hour heard every Sunday on WMBS radio.

*Local resident, now a student at WVU, was featured in Dec. 5 issue of Life Magazine (pages 86-87) depicting an Anti-Nazi fraternity party where a young man came dressed as Hitler of Germany with the slogan "Every Man a Fuehrer."

*Teachers were urged to spruce up --no drab clothes!

*Creel's Christmas trees-sold across from Hunker's Drug Store for \$.40 up.

*Montgomery Ward's Christmas ad-floor model radio with 11 tube Ac, 3 band, 41" cabinet floor model for \$47.95 for only \$5 monthly. *"They said it couldn't be done!" PM Hardware also has RCA Victor radios for \$69.95.

Dec. 15--PMHS enjoy a Christmas holiday for 12 days from Dec. 22-Jan. 3.

*Barney's Theatre offers 50 lucky readers a free show to each. Just find your name printed in the local paper.

Dec. 22--New grocery store and meat market opens on Main St. next to West Penn office. Alfred McCloy is the owner.

Dec. 29--Herb Morrison, son of Mrs. Bertha Morrison of Lake Lynn, was in Lakehurst, New Jersey when the Hindenberg disaster occurred in May 1937. He was written up in the Sunday edition of the Pittsburgh newspaper as he was the only radio man on the scene.

*Point Marion was caught in the grip of the worst wind storm since 1936. 80-100 mph winds caused power outages.

1939--Dec. 7--Representatives of the American Auto Assoc., The WPA Adult Education Program and the PA Motor Police met to finalize plans for the installation of a Community Highway Safety Driving School in Point Marion.

*The Point Marion News has a 10-page supplement in addition to the regular edition.

*Men's top coats at Seigel's Dept. Store is \$13.95 up. Sadler's Variety has men's ties at \$.25, women's silk hose \$.59.

Dec. 14--New Girl Scout troop established in area. The first troop has been functioning for some time. All troops are sponsored by the Progress Club.

Dec. 15--Fifteen youthful voices will comprise the choir in the Christmas Operetta at Gans Hill School.

Dec. 21--Electric power lines are being erected this week as residents have been without power. Local residents have homes there at Lake O' Woods near Wymps Gap. Homes in the Kendall Mill section above Lake Lynn are also being made ready for electric.

Dec. 27--Mrs. Hannah June Sadler Wright, town's oldest resident dies at 94. She was born in the first log house built in town where her great grandfather Jacob Sadler settled. She married Ted Wright in March 15, 1871 and built a house on Freeling St. In July 1902, they moved to a house top of the hill near the reservoir. The house is still used as a private residence.

Dec. 28--Movie Ninotchke now playing at Barney's Theatre. Ad says "Don't try to pronounce it--just see it for it is the best comedy of the year."

*George "Baldy" DuFour--(PMHS graduate 1928) baseball player signs with the St. Louis Cardinals in the Middle Atlantic League. He will go to Training Camp in April.

1942--The Nilan Church held a special service to dedicate the American flag and honor roll of the 27 now serving in the armed forces.

1949--Special at Klein's Dept. Store was the new Tappan Gas Range for only \$199.50.

1950--Secretary of Labor ruled that a minimum age of 18 is necessary for anyone in a mining occupation.

1953--Absolam B. McClain, age 90, dies. He built and sold over 60 of Point Marion's first homes.

1976--There are no Christmas street decorations this year because of the poor condition of the current 15 year old decorations. The former Chamber of Commerce (now inactive) had purchased the decorations and the fireman installed the decorations as a community service.

1978--In an annual report, 1400 used the public library.

1988--Point Marion receives funding to install a complete new water system and storage tank. \$900,000 grant and a \$500,000 loan were the amounts.

1993--The Point Marion Lock project was completed (started in March 1990). The total estimated cost, funded 50% by federal monies and 50% by Inland Waterways Trust Fund was \$107.2 million.

1997--The Point Marion Ambulance has been certified and approved as an Advanced Life Support Provider and the ambulance has been licensed as a Mobile Intensive Care Unit, in accordance with the requirements of the PA Dept. of Health.

Other areas:

1888 --Dec. 17--The debut of Uniontown's newspaper--The Evening Standard.

1910--Louise Morris of Morris Crossroads married Al Ringling, oldest of the 5 famous Ringling Brothers. She then joined the circus as a horseback rider and snake charmer. Ringling Bros. purchased Barnum and Bailey around 1913.

1941--Dec. 7--Japanese bomb Pearl Harbor. Eight draft boards functioned in Fayette County. In 1944, there were 15,000 from Fayette County in the Armed Forces.

1962--Dec. 6--Robena Mine disaster claimed 37 lives. Thirty of them were from Fayette County.

1974--A major snowstorm hits the area and a good part of the county lost electric power.
